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Prior to the public hearing portion of the agenda, Mayor Barberio introduced Kevin Ryan, Parsippany’s Water Superintendent, to address concerns regarding the “Township of Parsippany-Troy Hills Water Department Consumer Confidence Report - 2010,” a copy of which is attached (Attachment No. 1). Ms. Lim provided copies of this report to the Council Members.

Mr. Ryan noted that a Consumer Guidance Report is mailed yearly on July 1 to residents. He explained that the “Continued Susceptibility Ratings” reflected in the Report is prepared by the NJDEP and that this ratings system reflects a potential for contamination, not actual contamination. He indicated that the “Table of Detected Primary Contaminants” covers all of Parsippany’s wells; if an elevated level of contaminants occurs, the monitoring program would be adjusted accordingly. He pointed out that information relative to the Morris County Police and Fire Academy; approximately one dozen homes off of Johnson Road (Malapardis and White Birch Lane); and homes in the Puddingstone area is not included in this report. Separate reports from the water companies who service these areas are provided to those residents.

Council Vice-President Fox asked if members of the public had any questions. The following individuals spoke:

**Tom Wyka, 1 Bennett Court**, asked if there were any mitigation procedures for the contaminant that was detected in the well.

Mr. Ryan, in response to this question, noted that the reading was low and no mitigation would be required. He advised that the standards are set by the NJDEP and the US EPA.

**Richard Rosenthal, 3 Cambridge Road**, questioned the presence of “Volatile Organic Compounds,” noting his concern with the presence of any contaminants in the water.

Mr. Ryan clarified the numbers provided by the DEP. He assured the public that our water quality meets the standards.

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**PUBLIC HEARING**

**Council Vice-President Fox opened the meeting to the public to speak on any topic, noting a five-minute time limit per speaker.**

**Robert Simpson, 30 Hilsinger Road**, provided a newspaper article regarding the funding of a “quiet zone” in Edison with the help of grant money received from the NJDOT and Middlesex County.

Mayor Barberio advised Mr. Simpson that he spoke with Justin Lizza, Township Engineer, and will meet with him again next week regarding this matter.

**Christopher J. Brown, 141 Rutgers Lane**, stated that he is a Captain with the Rockaway Neck First Aid Squad and a 21-year member of the Squad. He indicated that he wants to correct some misconceptions regarding the volunteer squads’ availability to answer emergency calls. He advised that volunteer organizations will continue to serve the needs of the residents as they have for many years. In his opinion, there is no need for an additional paid EMS crew as the volunteers are able to handle calls that are received on weekends. Mr. Brown, on behalf of the Rockaway Neck First Aid Squad and the Parsippany Volunteer Ambulance Squad, reiterated the volunteers’ commitment to the community.

**Jennifer Thurkauf, 309 South Beverwyck Road**, Captain of the Parsippany Volunteer Ambulance Squad and a member for 17 years, stated that the volunteers give their time and take pride in their service to the community. She expressed her concerns regarding the hiring of an additional paid EMS crew, noting that the volunteers have been providing coverage during the day to the community; therefore, she does not understand the need for an additional paid crew. Ms. Thurkauf indicated that she would like to meet with the Mayor and the appropriate department heads to keep the lines of communication open between the Township and the volunteer squads.

**Tom Wyka, 1 Bennett Court**, asked if any developments have been made regarding “Citizens Campaign Call to Service,” which promotes greater public involvement in local government. Regarding the Municipal Transparency Committee, he questioned if some action could be taken over the next few weeks to fill vacant positions. He pointed out that the Economic Advisory Development Committee requires a quorum of six people. If enough resumes have been received and the number of members previously appointed is enough for a quorum, he would like to know if the Committee can meet and begin working on issues.

Mayor Barberio stated that he met with Harry Pozicki, Chairman of Citizens Campaign, who will provide ideas to the Township Council about increasing public involvement. Mr. Pozicki will also conduct seminars on the duties of the various boards and committees. Additionally, Mayor Barberio advised that he is looking into revising the Township website to make it more user friendly and to include information regarding the duties of the various boards along with contact information.

**Roy Messmer, 10 Drumlin Drive**, stated that he felt it was unfair that employees of the Township received pay raises with the exception of the White Collar Workers. He expressed his opinion that the Mayor should have gotten rid of the “dead wood” on the Township payroll. He would like to know from where the funding for the 2.5% increase received by the Police is coming.

Relative to another topic, Mr. Messmer noted that one of the apartment complexes in the Township has used approximately 300% more water than other similarly sized apartment complexes. Mayor Barberio advised that he will contact the Water Department regarding this water usage.

Regarding the 2.5% increase for the Police Department, Mayor Barberio explained that he negotiated the contract in good faith, noting that the cap was supposed to be at 2.5%. He also wanted to avoid arbitration that might have resulted in a larger increase. The lack of raises for White Collar employees was something that he did not want to do. The alternative would have been layoffs; he chose not to lay anyone off. If raises are given next year, per Mayor Barberio, there will be major layoffs and major furloughs required to balance the budget. Mayor Barberio further explained that a significant amount of revenue was lost to the State this year, which required major cuts to the budget to meet the tax levy; next year the cuts will be even greater. Mr. Fox stated that, based on his experience, a greater increase would have been granted as a result of arbitration. Mr. dePierro noted that he also has never heard of an arbitrator ruling in favor of a municipality. He noted that the question of ability to pay for increases is not considered.

Mr. Inglesino indicated that, to date, there have been no significant changes to the arbitration process and the decision was made with the knowledge that the amounts being awarded as a result of arbitration were in the 3.5 to 4.0% range. Other concessions were made during the negotiations that would not have been awarded under the arbitration process.

**Pat Petaccia, 182 Hawkins Avenue**, stated that she was upset regarding the 2.5% increase for the Police and expressed her view that, perhaps, the Township should have gone to arbitration. The police, in her opinion, need to make concessions regarding wages. Additionally, she felt the need for residents to be more aware of the terms of labor contracts.

Mayor Barberio noted that concessions were made regarding health insurance, days off, and compensatory time.

**James Clark, 15 Wenonah Avenue**, a Lieutenant with the Rockaway Neck First Aid Squad, questioned the pay rate per shift for the EMTs. Mr. Clark noted that he was previously a paid EMT and that his orientation consisted of hands on training, with experience being gained by riding along and performing the same in house duties as an experienced EMT.

Mayor Barberio addressed Mr. Clark's comments. He indicated that he would check into the reason for the EMT crew being on duty this past Sunday. The Mayor advised that, first and foremost, he wants to retain the highest quality of public safety for the Township. If it is determined that there is no need for the second ambulance, then he will discharge them, but not at the expense of safety.

**Nan Riffel, 36 Hamburg Road**, noted she is a longtime volunteer and that both the volunteers and paid EMTs have the same certification.

**Helen Scarnato, Deputy Tax Collector, 29 Village Drive, Convent Station**, expressed her view that police and Board of Education salaries are ridiculous. She noted that the tax bills being mailed contain a 4½% increase. She thought the freeze on raises covered all employees as opposed to just White Collar employees. She indicated that her office has an approximately 99% collection rate and, in her opinion, you can't do much better. She noted that this will impact her pension as she will be retiring in three years and the pension received is based on the last three years of salary.

**Robert J. Campbell, 189 Old Bloomfield Avenue**, thanked the volunteers and expressed his support for them. Additionally, he took this opportunity to inform the Council that the first elected Mayor of Parsippany, Francis X. Downey, does not have a commemorative plaque in the Municipal Building. He would like to see one for this former Mayor and firefighter.

**Seeing no one else come forward to speak, Council Vice-President Fox closed the public portion of the meeting.**

Mayor Barberio stated that he appreciates all the work that volunteers do within the community. He noted that he had received numerous calls that emergency calls were not being answered; that was the reasoning behind the hiring of a second paid EMT crew. He indicated that he is considering the creation of an Emergency Response Task Force, which will include a member of the public, a prominent member of the volunteers and the Deputy Chief, for the purpose of analyzing the data and providing a report that will recommend whether or not another ambulance is necessary. The creation of the Emergency Response Task Force will be discussed at a meeting on July 21 with all affected parties present. The Mayor pointed out that the population of Parsippany doubles during the day; his main concern is safety.

Mr. dePierro stated that during the budget hearings he was told that the volunteers were unable to handle the calls so there was a need for the second EMT squad. Based upon information he received, he is not sure that a second paid squad is needed. However, he will wait until the Mayor has all the information and report back to the Council. Mr. dePierro indicated that he would like the purchase of a new ambulance to be put on hold until he receives an explanation regarding the need for this purchase. ***Introduction***

The Township of Parsippany-Troy Hills (PTH) Water Department is pleased to present you with its annual Consumer Confidence Report. The purpose of this report is to provide the consumers of the Township of Parsippany -Troy Hills with a greater understanding of the quality of our drinking water and the system that delivers the water from the source to the user. This report contains information about the PTH Water System, addresses the many biological issues of water in general, and provides 2009 water monitoring information displaying the high quality and reliability of Parsippany's water.

The water for Parsippany-Troy Hills Township is derived from 19 active ground water wells located within the Township. For those who reside to the east of I-287, the Jersey City Reservoir now supplements the Townships water supply in the summer months. A copy of the Jersey City water quality table is included in this report.

***Parsippany's Source Water Assessment***

The New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection has completed and issued the Source Water Assessment Report and Summary for this public water system, which is available at [www.state.nj.us/dep/swap](http://www.state.nj.us/dep/swap) or by contacting the Bureau of Safe Drinking Water at 609-292-5550. Listed below is a brief summary of this report.

The Township of Parsippany-Troy Hills Water Department is a public community water system consisting of 19 well(s), 0- wells under the influence of surface water, 0 -surface water intake(s), 3 purchased ground water source(s), and 1- purchased surface water source(s).

Parsippany's source water comes from the following aquifer(s) and/or surface water body(s): Glacial sand and gravel aquifer.

Parsippany has emergency interconnections with the following water system(s): Town of Boonton, Township of Denville, Borough of Mountain Lakes.

Purchased Surface Water Source: Jersey City Reservoir.

***Susceptibility Ratings for Township of Parsippany-Troy Hills Water Department Sources***

The table on the next page illustrates the susceptibility ratings for the seven contaminant categories (and radon) for each source in the system. The table provides the number of wells and intakes that rated high (H), medium (M), or low (L) for each contaminant category. For susceptibility ratings of purchased water, refer to the specific water system's source water assessment report.

The contaminant categories are defined on the next page. DEP considered all surface water highly susceptible to pathogens, therefore all intakes received a high rating for the pathogen category. For the purpose of Source Water Assessment Program, radionuclides are more of a concern for ground water than surface water. As a result, surface water intakes susceptibility to radionuclides was not determined and they all received a low rating.

If a system is rated highly susceptible for a contaminant category, it does not mean a customer is or will be consuming contaminated drinking water. The rating reflects the potential for contamination of source water, not the existence of contamination. Public water systems are required to monitor for regulated contaminants and to install treatment if any contaminants are detected at frequencies and concentration above allowable levels.

**Definitions**

- **Pathogens:** Disease-causing organisms such as bacteria and viruses. Common sources are animal and human fecal wastes.
- **Nutrients:** Compounds, minerals and elements that aid growth, that are both naturally occurring and man-made. Examples include nitrogen and phosphorus.
- **Volatile Organic Compounds:** Man-made chemicals used as solvents, degreasers, and gasoline components. Examples include benzene, methyl tertiary butyl ether (MTBE), and vinyl chloride.
- **Pesticides:** Man-made chemicals used to control pests, weeds and fungus. Common sources include land application and manufacturing centers of pesticides. Examples include herbicides such as atrazine, and insecticides such as chlordane.
- **Inorganics:** Mineral-based compounds that are both naturally occurring and man-made. Examples include arsenic, asbestos, copper, lead, and nitrate.
- **Radionuclides:** Radioactive substances that are both naturally occurring and man-made. Examples include radium and uranium.
- **Radon:** Colorless, odorless, cancer-causing, gas that occurs naturally in the environment. For more information go to <http://www.nj.gov/dep/rpp/radon/index.htm> or call (800) 648-0394.
- **Disinfection Byproduct Precursors:** A common source is naturally occurring organic matter in surface water. Disinfection byproducts are formed when the disinfectants (usually chlorine) used to kill pathogens react with dissolved organic material (for example leaves) present in surface water.

**Water Quality**

To ensure that the water serving the community is of the highest quality, the PTH Water Department monitors and tests for physical, chemical, and bacterial contaminants in the water. The contaminants are monitored and regulated by the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection and the USEPA. Water samples are obtained at selected Township wells and within selected locations of the distribution system. The samples are collected and forwarded to certified accredited laboratories that are required to report the results of the tests to the NJDEP and indicate if a high level was detected.

The sources of drinking water (both tap and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or human activity. Contaminants that may be present in source water, and are therefore tested.

Aesthetic qualities, such as odor, taste, hardness, and appearance, are also monitored by the Township. These qualities are tested as secondary standards, since they impose no harmful impact on health.

They cover minerals and nutrients such as Iron, Manganese, and Sodium. These secondary standards do not pose a health risk to healthy individuals. They can cause aesthetic problems such as taste, odor or visual appearance. The recommended upper limit for manganese is based on staining of laundry. Manganese is an essential nutrient, and toxicity is not expected from levels which would be encountered in drinking water.

### **Waivers**

The Safe Drinking Water Act regulations allow monitoring waivers to reduce or eliminate the monitoring requirements for Asbestos, Volatile Organic Chemicals, and Synthetic Organic Chemicals. Our system received monitoring waivers for two of these contaminants (Asbestos and Synthetic Organic Chemicals).

### **Special Considerations Regarding Children**

Children may receive a slightly higher amount of a contaminant present in the water than do adults, on a body weight basis, because they may drink a greater amount of water per pound of body weight than do adults. For this reason, reproductive or developmental effects are used for calculating a drinking water standard if these effects occur at lower levels than other health effects of concern. If there is insufficient toxicity information for a chemical (for example, lack of data on reproductive or developmental effects), an extra uncertainty factor may be incorporated into the calculation of the drinking water standard, thus making the standard more stringent, to account for additional uncertainties regarding these effects. In the cases of lead and nitrate, effects on infants and children are the health endpoints upon which the standards are based.

### **Detected Contaminants**

All drinking water, including bottled spring water, may reasonably be expected to contain small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the EPA's Safe Drinking Water Hotline (1-800-426-4791).

Contaminants detected in the Township's water system are shown on the next page within a table listing the contamination level. The data shown in this table reflects sampling performed in 2009 and representative testing performed in previous years. In this table you will find many terms and abbreviations you may not be familiar with. To help you better understand these terms, we have provided the following definitions:

- **Action Level (AL)**: The concentration of a contaminant which, when exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements which a water system must follow.
- **Not Applicable (N/A)**
- **Non Detects (ND)** Laboratory analysis indicates that the constituent is not present.
- **No standard (NS)**
- **Parts per million (ppm) or Milligrams per liter (mg/l)** - one part per million -corresponds to one minute in two years, or a single penny in \$10,000.
- **Parts per billion (ppb) or Micrograms per liter** - one part per billion-corresponds to one minute in 2,000 years, or a single penny in \$10,000,000.
- **Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL)**- The "Maximum Allowed" is the highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.
- **Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG)** - The "Goal" is the level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.
- **Picocuries per liter (pCi/L)**- picocuries per liter is a measure of the radioactivity in water.

### **Detected Contaminants Continued**

As noted previously, the presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the EPA or DEP Safe Drinking Water Hotline (telephone numbers shown later).

We have learned through our monitoring and testing that some contaminants have been detected. As you can see by the table, our system had no violations. We are proud that our drinking water meets or exceeds all federal and state safety standards.

Any questions regarding the list of contaminants tested or any other issue regarding testing can be directed to the PTH Water Department (telephone number's shown later).

### **Lead**

*If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. The Parsippany Water Department is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water, you may wish to have your water tested. Information on lead in drinking water is available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline or at <http://www.epa.gov/safewater/lead>.*

### **Security**

The PTH Water Department in conjunction with the Mayor's Office and the Parsippany Police Department has taken up additional security measures in light of the events of 9/11. **We ask that if you see anything suspicious or someone tampering with the water system to please report it immediately.**

### **Vulnerable Populations**

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immune-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergone chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. EPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by Cryptosporidium and other microbial contaminants are available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline shown at the end of this report. Cryptosporidium is a microscopic parasite that can be found in surface water, such as rivers and lakes. It is found in feces of humans and many domestic and wild animals. Since the Township system obtains its water from groundwater resources, the Township is not at risk from this microbe. Tests on the Township's water supply did not reveal any traces of Cryptosporidium within the system.

### **Other Facts About Drinking Water**

In general, the testing indicated that the Township's water contains hardness concentrations higher than the recommended level. Hardness is a relative measure of calcium and other minerals that naturally occur in water. Hard water has no impact on the health quality of the water, but the hard water affects the ability of the water to produce suds from soaps and detergents. Hard water also creates deposits in hot water heaters and plumbing. The hardness of our water is approximately 22 grains per gallon.

**Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL)**

The highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

**Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG)**

The level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.

**Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level (MRDL)**

The highest level of a disinfectant allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that addition of disinfectant is necessary for control of microbial contaminants.

**Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level Goal (MRDLG)**

**Waiver Information**

The Safe Drinking Water Act (SDWA) regulations allow monitoring waivers to reduce or eliminate the monitoring requirements for asbestos, volatile organic chemicals (VOC's), and Synthetic Organic Chemicals (SOC's). United Water Jersey Citys received monitoring Waivers for asbestos, VOC's, and SOC's.

The system has the asbestos waiver because there is no asbestos pipe in the distribution system. The waiver for VOC's is because it is a surface water supply where volatiles are not generally a problem and a SOC waiver because the system is not vulnerable to this type of contaminant.

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### Lawn Watering Restrictions

A reminder to all residents and businesses, permanent lawn watering restrictions are in effect from June 1st through September 30th, per the Township Water Conservation Ordinance. The limits on lawn watering are listed below.

Residential Lawn Watering: Properties having an even number street address are only permitted to water on even number days from 5am-9am and 5pm-9pm. Residential properties having an odd number street address are only permitted to water on odd number days from 5am-9am and 5pm-9pm. No watering is permitted on Fridays or on the 31st day of the month.

Non-Residential Lawn Watering: Watering is permitted only on Mondays and Thursdays, from 5am-9am and 5pm-9pm. No watering is permitted on the 31st day of the month.

### Water Conservation

We encourage our customers to use water wisely, even when supplies are abundant. If you don't conserve, you're pouring water, and money, down the drain. The average American can drink, shower, and flush between 40 and 130 gallons of water every day. You can reduce your water consumption by up to 25 % by taking just a few simple steps.

#### Here are some tips for conserving water inside your home:

- Turn off the tap when brushing your teeth.
- Never use your toilet as your wastebasket.
- Use a partially filled sink to rinse your razor.
- Take shorter showers or install water saving shower heads.



**ORDINANCE AMENDING  
THE MUNICIPAL TAXICABS AND LIMOUSINES  
ORDINANCE NO. 2010:19**

Be It Enacted by the Township Council of the Township of Parsippany-Troy Hills, County of Morris:

**Preamble**

WHEREAS, the State of New Jersey enacted P.L. 2009, Chapter 325 on January 18, 2010; and

WHEREAS, that new law calls for amendments to the laws governing the operations of limousines; and

WHEREAS, the Township must amend its current ordinance governing limousine licensing as a result.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Mayor and Governing Body of the Township of Parsippany-Troy Hills, in the County of Morris, and State of New Jersey, as follows:

**SECTION 1**

Section 372-1 of the municipal code shall be amended as follows:

**LIMOUSINE**

Any automobile or motor car used in the business of carrying passengers for hire to provide prearranged passenger transportation at a premium fare on a dedicated, nonscheduled, charter basis that is not conducted on a regular route and with a seating capacity of no more than 14 passengers, not including the driver, provided that such a vehicle is certified by the manufacturer of the original vehicle and the second-stage manufacturer, if applicable, to conform to all applicable Federal Motor Vehicle Safety Standards promulgated by the United States Department of Transportation pursuant to 49 CFR Part 571 (49 CFR 571.1 et seq) and 49 CFR Part 567 (49 CFR 567.1 et seq.), as defined in N.J.S.A. 48:16-13.

**SECTION 2**

Section 372-8 of the municipal code shall be amended as follows:

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D. License fee. The annual fee for a limousine owner's license shall be fifty dollars (\$50) for the limousine service plus ten dollars (\$10) for each limousine which is covered under the insurance policy set forth in subsection B(1)(b) of this Chapter.

\* \* \*

F. Posting of license. Pursuant to N.J.S.A. 48:16-17, each limousine license shall recite the name of the insurance company, the number and date of expiration of the insurance policy, a description of the limousine insured thereunder and the registration number of the limousine insured thereunder. The original license or a copy thereof shall be retained within the limousine and shall be available for inspection.

\* \* \*

J. Additional rules and regulations. In addition to the rules and regulations set forth herein, the State of New Jersey and the Motor Vehicle Commission have further statutes, rules, and regulations with regard to the operation of limousines and the conduct and licensing of operators thereof. The Township Council may, by resolution, make such rules and regulations in relation to the operation of limousines and the conduct of operators thereof as they may determine to be necessary and proper in the best interests of the Township. A certified copy of any such resolution shall be forwarded to all licensees within 10 days following adoption.

K. Penalties. Any person or persons, firms, corporations, or other organizations found to be in violation of this section shall, upon conviction thereof in municipal court in addition to the penalties provided by N.J.S.A. 48:16-22.3, pay a fine of not less than \$50 or more than \$200 for the first offense, and for each subsequent offense shall upon conviction pay a fine not to exceed \$1,000. The Municipal Court Judge may also impose if he or she so desires a jail term not to exceed 90 days or community service not to exceed 90 days. In addition to such penalties, every license granted pursuant to this section may be revoked by the Township Clerk upon evidence of failure to comply with any provision of N.J.S.A. 48:16-13 et seq.

**SECTION 3**

**Severability**

If any provision of this Ordinance, or the application of any such provision to any person or circumstances, shall be held invalid, the remainder of this Ordinance to the extent it can be given effect, or the application of such provision to persons or circumstances other than those to which it is held invalid shall not be affected thereby.

**SECTION 4**

**Repealer**

All ordinances or parts of ordinances which are inconsistent with any provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed as to the extent of such inconsistencies.

**SECTION 5**

**Effective Date**

This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its final passage, approval and publication as provided by law.
